# A NEED FOR "LIFE . . . MORE ABUNDANTLY"

From time to time, the Rev. Harry Johansen, Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church of Flushing, New York, was called to perform various pastoral services in the quaint hamlet of Glen Head and Glenwood Landing. During his visits, a number of families expressed a strong desire for a Lutheran Church in this community.

Encouraged by possibilities, Rev. Johansen called the item to the attention of the Lutheran Laymen's Home Mission Committee of the New York area. On April 29, 1944, a meeting was held at the Parkside Hotel, New York City, in which the Laymen's group voted to conduct a survey and petition the District Home Mission Committee for approval to begin the work. After proper study, the Board of Home Missions granted the approval and agreed to provide the necessary financing.

The officers of the Layman's group met in November, 1944, at the home of Mrs. Ruth Nelson. She was asked to organize a committee to arrange for the first general meeting. The committee was comprised of Mrs. Anna Svendsen, Ann Thorsen, Hilda Smith, Ruth Smith, and Ruth Nelson.

On December 8, 1944, this meeting was held in the basement of the Post Office building in the Glen Head Plaza. As noted in the records by one attendee, "It poured rain the whole day. The room was cold and dismal, not too well heated. There was one lonely light which reflected in the puddles of water on the floor, but warmed by our undaunted spirits, we grouped together in the middle of the room." All those present expressed themselves as being enthusiastic for the formation of a Lutheran Church. Among those present at this meeting were the Rev. Helmar Halvorson, Chairman, Circuit Home Mission Board and pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, Brooklyn, New York; Rev. C. O. Pedersen, Rector of the Norwegian Lutheran Hospital, Brooklyn, New York; Rev. Oakdale, President, Atlantic Circuit; Rev. Reidar Thomte, Pastor Trinity Lutheran Church, Brooklyn, New York; and Dr. Irving Olsen, President of the Layman's Committee.

The first need was to find a place to worship. A committee of Mrs. Ruth Nelson, Naomi Ramberg, Ruth Smith, Mathilde Midtbo, Mr. Einar Ramberg, and L. Patterson was appointed to survey the community for a suitable place to worship. On January 12, 1945, a special business meeting was held at which the recommendation of the committee was accepted that the building on Glen Head Road and Wall Street in Glen Head be rented for one year at a monthly rental of \$50.00. The building had been erected as a tavern but was being used as a music hall by Ms. Helen Belski. It was finally secured for a temporary place of worship. At this same meeting, Mr. Einar Ramberg was elected to serve as Chairman and Miss Mabel Midtbo as Secretary and Treasurer.

After much hard work, the building was made into an attractive Church. The first worship service was held on January 21, 1945. Pastor Arne Unhjem, Youth Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Brooklyn, New York, conducted the service. He used as his text . . . John 10, Verses 7-11, his sermon theme . . . "Life . . . More Abundantly."

Pastor Herbert A. Hanson was called to be the first pastor, and he held his first service in this little Chapel on February 18, 1945. At this time, the Congregation numbered only 39 families. There were 66 adults and 57 children . . . a total of 123 baptized souls.

On August 7, 1945, this small band of parishioners initiated a charter membership drive to establish a recognized Lutheran Church in the community. A Charter roll of 66 members was submitted in February, 1946, to the Home Mission Committee of the Eastern District, (Norwegian) Evangelical Lutheran Church. It read:

"We, the undersigned, respectfully request that a Lutheran Church be organized in Glen Head, Long Island, New York. We desire to become members of such a Lutheran Church. We promise to attend the services of the Church faithfully and support it with our means as God prospers us.

The names of those following shall be known as the charter members. By decision of the local Church Council, the privilege of becoming charter members shall be closed by the tenth day of February 1946."


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As the success and fulfillment of the Church progressed, the people began to long for a Church building of their own. A loan from the Home Mission Department opened the way and on November 13, 1946, a "cabbage patch" of six lots was purchased on Glenwood Road for \$4,000.00 which became the present Church property. The Congregation became self-supporting on January 1, 1948.

With the approval of the congregation, the Church Officers embarked on the task of seeking an architect to design a parsonage and church building which would be within their financial limitations and still serve as the initial base for a complete church. Alfred Shaknis, an architect living in Glen Head, was selected, and after many revisions, final plans were approved. Harbor View Homes, Inc., under Clifford Staudinger, Vice President, was awarded the contract as the general contractor.

Since there was no place for the pastor to live, a Parsonage was built first, and this was completed on January 6, 1948, at a cost of \$16,499.00. Dedication of the Parsonage took place on the rainy afternoon of May 16, 1948, at 4:00 P.M. with Dr. Frederick Schiotz, President of the Atlantic Circuit, performing the dedication.


In August, 1948, construction was begun on the Church itself. Everyone turned out to help with the work. The ceremony for the laying of the cornerstone was held on October 31, 1948, at 3:00 P.M. Dr. J. A. Aasgaard, President of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, officiated.





The first unit (East end) of the structure was made ready for the first service held on Christmas Eve, 1948. The Congregation was thrilled with the simple beauty of the Church. Many hearts were thankful to the Lord for His many rich blessings upon His people. The Congregation finally had a Church of their own.

This First Unit was officially dedicated on May 8, 1949, at 4:00 P.M.



#### DISASTER STRIKES . . .

The exultation and happiness of the Congregation was short-lived! On December 9, 1949, at approximately 1:30 A.M., a neighbor saw flames rising from the Church. It was almost completely destroyed. Firemen from the Glenwood Fire Department waged a huge battle to save the building but damage was estimated at over \$25,000.





Preliminary investigation indicated that the fire may have started in the furnace room. The Baldwin organ, less than one year old, was a total loss. Determined to rebuild their beloved Church, the Congregation set about the task with a renewed spirit and faith. Offers of assistance came from many places. Local churches and organizations sent contributions. The story of the fire was told on the Arthur Godfrey radio show. Letters, with gifts, came from all parts of the country. By March 5, 1950, the Congregation was back in their Sanctuary for worship, and soon the Church building was completely rebuilt.

As time went on, pews were installed and an organ was added. Mr. Emanuel Thompsen, a member of the Congregation and fine cabinet maker, made a beautiful pulpit. On February 11, 1951, a special service was held at 4:00 P.M. to dedicate the Church Pews. The funds for the pews were contributed by over 100 members and local businesses. A memoriam read:

"In humble gratitude for the gracious influences of departed loved ones, we hereby dedicate these pews to their sacred memories."

Everything possible was done to make the little Church as beautiful and as worshipful as possible. It served the Congregation well.





Still most people were aware of the fact that the Church was incomplete. People began to look forward to the day when they could complete the dream which the charter members had begun. Many prayers and many hours of toil, almost without end, were given in order that they could accomplish their goal. Finally, on December 1, 1964, construction began once again. Alfred Shaknis, the original Architect, and Harbor View Homes, Inc., the original general contractor, were engaged again for the extension of the west end of the building.



The west wall was removed, and a new Chancel and Altar were incorporated. By Palm Sunday, April 11, 1965, the people were worshipping in the new Sanctuary. On May 23, 1965, amid joyful music, many clergymen, past pastors of OUR SAVIOR'S, and grateful parishioners, the present Church was dedicated to the glory of God and to the service of His people.

"A LITTLE ADVENT MUSIC"

"A Little Advent Music" was first conducted by Hugo Distler (1908-1942) on November 29, 1931, Hugo Distler at the St. Jakobikirche in Lübeck, where he had been organist less than a year, having come to the church directly from the Conservatory in Leipzig. The Chorale on which the work is based, "Nun Komm, der Heiden Heiland," is Luther's version of the ancient Latin hymn, "Veni, Redemptor gentium," attributed to St. Ambrose.




#### OUR CHURCH TODAY

Our Church can best be described as Long Island Colonial Architecture. It is especially designed to fit into the community in which it is located. Whether one officiates at the Altar or sits in the pew, you cannot help but be impressed by the quiet beauty, the creative carvings, and the spirit of reverence and dignity which prevails. From the moment you enter the Nave, your eyes are drawn to the Chancel and Altar.

The Chancel with its outward expression of the Word and Sacrament provides the setting for the Altar. The Altar has the undisputed place of honor for it symbolizes all that our Lord has done for us in love and mercy. The whole Church is designed in such a way that immediately upon entering it, every eye is carried forward to rest upon the Altar. A silent sermon is preached to all who enter: "The Lord is in His Holy Temple; let all the earth keep silent before Him."



As seen from above, the Church is in the form of a cross. Each section is noted on the following plan:



As noted earlier, the Chancel is outlined by two arches. The Chancel is not a straight line area from the Transept but slants in towards the Altar. You will note that there is a slight decrease in the size of the squares of the ceiling and that the walls bend in toward the Altar. The architect termed this "Enforced Perspective". All of these characteristics seem to accent a three-dimensional form. This is further accentuated by the rise in the platforms toward the Altar.

Both of the arches in the Chancel have exquisite carvings depicting specific religious items. Large carvings are followed by smaller carvings in between each main carving. They have been interpreted literally as follows:


#### ALTAR

The original Altar was constructed by the men of the Church and dedicated, along with the Chancel and railings, on April 1, 1945. This Altar is still in use today by the Sunday School in the Undercroft of the Church.

The present Altar is made of Italian marble set on a sturdy oak frame. The large and small symbols carved on the pedestal represent the following from left to right:

Communion Cup
Greek Cross
IHS (Greek symbol for Jesus)

a table to hold communion vessels.

"Cup of Blessing" to hold the wine for Holy Communion.

Paten

a plate to hold the Host, the wafer (or bread) to be

consecrated.

Ciborium

a vessel used for storing and distributing the wafers.

Cruets

a vessel to hold wine and water (symbolizing the water and

the blood that flowed from Jesus's side.)

Purificator

a linen used to cleanse the Chalice.

Pall

a cover for the Chalice and Paten.

Veil

a linen to cover the communion vessels.

Individual Cups

small cups in circular trays used in the distribution of Holy

Communion.


Candles

symbols of Christ's presence as the Light of the World. They express the Glory and Joy of our faith.


Paschal Candle


a candle lit for Easter season, for Baptisms and for Funerals. It signifies the death and resurrection of Jesus and all baptized into Him.











# SANCTUARY WINDOWS OF OUR CHURCH

Produced for our window committee by the Rodier Company of New York City, the sanctuary windows are constructed of laminated glass in mosaic design to produce the symbols of the Christian Faith.

As the Medieval Gothic cathedral windows sought to instruct the faithful in the gospel by portraying scriptural teachings, these windows use a wealth of color and symbols to remind us of the doctrines of the Christian faith and their relationship to our life.


Certain themes are apparent in the individual windows, but no single window is exclusively devoted to a single theme. We ought not to try to firmly summarize the message of our windows, but let them speak for themselves to our changing moods and needs as we worship. For the purpose of locating and designating them, the following is offered as a suggestion of the themes:


# NORTH SIDE OF SANCTUARY - from the Chancel to the Narthex

# **EPIPHANY**

("manifestation")

With light - candle, dawn, crowns, and growing productive vines, the artist speaks of the effect of the appearance of God's Son on the earth.






NATIVITY
("place of birth")

Focusing on a child, in the familiar creche, encircled by the traditional flowers and tree of Christmas in our culture, this window speaks of the Incarnation of God.

# **CHRIST**

("One Anointed to Save")


The figure of a man, surrounded by monograms and symbols of the fulfillment of the scriptural promises of a Savior for humanity, identifies Jesus as the "Hope of all the Earth".




# **PENTECOST**

("festival of new harvests")

Focused in flames, but including the symbols of Baptism, Divine blessing, of growth and fruits, the artist indicates the source and varied manifestation of the new life which the Holy Spirit brought to the Christian Church.






# EVERLASTING LIFE

# SOUTH SIDE OF SANCTUARY - from the Chancel to the Narthex





The artist uses a star, a lamb, and an orb with cross to remind us of the fulfilling of the Old Covenant by the New Covenant, of the faithfulness of God in providing a plan of atonement for human sin.

# COMMISSION ("to bring together")

The artist places a man in a sea which flows between the opened scriptures and a church steeple, overarched by alpha and omega. The awesome fact of God's calling the church into life through Christ, the living Word, dominates man's involvement in this window.






ATONEMENT
("to bring into harmony")

We see combination of Cross, coins, and crown of thorns; fiery chariot, bursting pomegranate, butterfly, and lilies. Thus, the rich moods of the passion of Jesus and the Resurrection of Easter are pulled together in reminder that the Christian's hope of harmony between our life and our Lord is through the atoning death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

# **INVITATION**

("come unto me")

This window uses a garden scene to place a man and children in posture which makes us think of "Let the Children come to me." It emphasizes the centrality of humility and trust in the character of those who would come to Jesus as their Lord and Savior.



# **CONFIRMATION**

Early in the life of our new Church, the focus was on the youth of our Church both through Sunday School Classes and Confirmation Classes. "Confirmation" is the rite of admitting a baptized person to full membership in the Church following classes in religious education. As we celebrate the 50th Anniversary of Our Savior's Lutheran Church, we also celebrate the Confirmation of our youth whose religious life has been enhanced through these special classes and who have entered this responsible part of church life.

## CHURCH PROPERTIES

The following is a brief outline on the history of the land presently owned by the Church:

#### **CHURCH**

On August 17, 1946, an agreement to purchase the land for the Church buildings was entered into by Einar Ramberg, Church President. A deed dated November 13, 1946, covered the land purchased from Harold J. Simonson for \$4,000.00.

Construction costs of the Church were financed by the First National Bank of Glen Head. On February 1, 1949, a mortgage was given by the Evangelical Lutheran Church for \$49,608.96 to repay the First National Bank for its building advances.

In 1954, the Evangelical Lutheran Church was repaid the balance of the Mortgage by a \$23,000.00 loan from the First National Bank of Glen Head. On January 2, 1964, the Mortgage was repaid in full.

The mortgage for the completion of the Church building dated April 8, 1965, for \$110,000.00 was repaid in full and discharged on February 23, 1981.

#### PARISH HOUSE

On November 28, 1956, a contract of sale was made with Marguerite Seacombe to purchase the property and house at 19 Glenwood Road for \$23,000.00.

The mortgage from the First National Bank on January 11, 1957, for \$13,800.00 was repaid in full and discharged on January 4, 1965.

The building was originally used for Sunday School classes, meetings of the Church Trustees, Deacons, and Council, and Pastor Glenn's office until the Church extension was completed in 1965.

## **PASTORS**

Through the years, OUR SAVIOR'S LUTHERAN CHURCH has been blessed with dedicated, loyal, and hardworking leaders, both in the spiritual and quality of our needs. Pastors who have served since the "birth of our church" are:

Pastor Johnson was recalled to active duty as a Chaplain in the U.S. Navy from June, 1952, to November, 1953. During this period, church services were ably rendered by Pastors Knute Lee, Kent Knutson, Drs. Joseph Simonson, and Frederick Schiotz.

#### PRESIDENTS AND CHURCH COUNCIL

Originally the Church was directed by the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Board of Deacons (6), and Board of Trustees (6). Later a Financial Secretary was added. Terms of the office were for 1 year only from 1946-1973, inclusive. In 1974, the terms were extended for 2 years with a maximum of 4 years. In 1970, the Board of Deacons and Board of Trustees were eliminated, and the election of Committees was begun. This Church Council continues to operate today.

## LADIES AID SOCIETY

During the years of 1941 through 1945, the first Ladies Aid Society met before the Congregation was organized. From the beginning, they were an active Society. Upon formation of the Church, the group was formally organized. Charter Members of this group were:

The first meeting was held on February 11, 1945, with the election of officers. Their first major financial contribution to the church was the successful dinner and bazaar on November 24, 1945, which netted \$500.00. On October 6, 1946, the Communion set given by the group was consecrated. On October 1, 1947, the Ladies Aid Society became a member of the Womens' Missionary Federation.

Today, there is no longer any Ladies Aid Society per se. All the women of the Church are members of Our Savior's Lutheran Church Women. In 1960, the Lutheran Churches all over the country merged, and Our Savior's Lutheran Women became affiliated with the American Lutheran Church (ALC) and were known as the American Lutheran Church Women (ALCW). There was subsequently another merger in 1988 with the Evangelical Lutheran Church, and the women are now known as Women of The Evangelical Lutheran Church (WELCA).

Over the years there have been a number of Circles concentrating on stewardship, missions, cradle roll, and bible study. Meeting monthly, the Martha Circle still functions for Bible Study and contributes to the Interfaith Nutrition Network by helping to support a child in South Dakota. Thankofferings are given 100% to WELCA and one half of monies from the worship offerings. WELCA Conferences are attended throughout the year.

The women continue to function as an arm of the Ministry of Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Education, Fellowship, Stewardship and Christian concern for one another.

## WOMEN'S WORKSHOP GROUP

"In the beginning" there was no Workshop. The women who were members of the Ladies Aid Society (and paid their 25 cents monthly dues) met each month in small groups (circles) where they knit, crocheted, embroidered, sewed, and did various crafts to be sold at the Christmas fundraiser.

When our Evangelical Lutheran Church Synod merged with the American Lutheran Church in 1960, Circles were to emphasize Bible study and Mission projects. Thereafter, the Workshop was born to provide women with a place to carry out the various projects that would help raise necessary funds to help support our Church. At first, the Workshop met once a month during the school year with a possible meeting during the summer months. The fellowship that developed at these meetings was so strong that the group was soon meeting every week year round. In the 1980's when the Circles were disbanding because of the number of women now working, it was decided to spend the first four months of each year on Mission projects and the balance of the year making items for the Christmas Boutique.

The Mission work included making quilts and afghans for Lutheran World Relief and putting together sewing kits and health kits for Third World Countries. With many people bringing in old blankets and gifts of rolls and rolls of beautiful fabric, the Workshop has turned out endless quilts, and the knitters have supplied hundreds of squares for the afghans.

In May, the craft work begins as members bring in their ideas for gift and Christmas items, and we repeat what has been a successful item in previous years. In early December, the Undercroft is a beehive of activity as the room is transformed into a picture of the Christmas season (with the help of the men in the Church), and the kitchen is abuzz with preparations for the annual holiday luncheon. Our greatest satisfaction comes when the Workshop is able to turn over a substantial check to the Church Council.

Fifteen to eighteen women meet faithfully and joyfully each week as they come and share working for their Church.

#### ALTAR GUILD

It started with "someone" preparing the Altar for the worship service. Now the privilege of serving is enjoyed by 12 women who work in pairs each month.

In the late 1950's, the group began to work in a scheduled manner. Each Sunday of the year and on other occasions, the Worship service is prepared with proper linens and paraments, candles, flowers, and the Holy Communion elements. The Baptismal Font is provided with water when being used for the Sacrament and a Baptismal "towel" which is given to the baby as a memento of this sacred occasion.

At Christmas time, the Christmas Trees are assembled and trimmed, the wreaths bought and hung, and aisle candles put in place and decorated. Poinsettia plants are ordered, arranged in the Altar area, and distributed. At Easter, Lilies are ordered, arranged in the Altar area, and distributed.

A Flower Chart for Altar Flowers is posted in the vestibule for weekly flower offerings given in celebration, in honor, as a thankoffering, and in memory of Loved Ones.



#### SUNDAY SCHOOL

"It cost us 10 cents each way to take the bus to Glen Cove where Rev. Arthur Steinke of the Trinity Evangelica Lutheran Church provided us with our early religious teachings," states Mabel as Charlotte, George, and Ruth nod in agreement. "Sometimes when the weather was good, we would spend the 10 cents at Felenz Bakery on School Street and then walk home to Glen Head," she continues. "Rev. Steinke was instrumental in providing us with a desire to learn". Thus, were the early beginnings of our Sunday School. Later, the sessions were held in the basement of the Glen Head Post Office.

When the Chapel became the site of Our Savior's Lutheran Church, it also became the first recognized location for our Sunday School. On March 4, 1945, the first official Sunday School service was held with 20 members present. Mr. S.A. Millwater was officially appointed as Superintendent of the Sunday School, Joan Anderson served as pianist, and Charlotte Christensen served as Secretary. Assigned teachers were:

Ruth Anderson - primary class - up to age 5
Mabel Midtbo - Intermediate - age 5 to 8
Grace Taylor - Junior - age 8 to 12
Pastor Hanson - Senior - Bible study

The construction of Our Savior's Lutheran Church attracted many young people, and the Sunday School grew and flourished until it overflowed the available facilities in the Church. The Parish House then provided the additional space for classes.

Today, our Sunday School continues to provide the need for religious education, fulfilling the desire to know about the Bible and its teachings, and ensuring the continued spiritual and physical leadership for the future.



Raise your voices" . . . and so it was as the music of the Church appeared two-fold.

## CHOIR/CHORAL SOCIETY

The first meeting of the choir took place on February 14, 1945. Mrs. Ruth Nelson was director and Mrs. Naomi Ramberg was the pianist. On September 16, 1945, the new long awaited hymnals were used for the first time.

The activities of the choir were not restricted to the Church. Still in its infancy, but thriving on its enthusiasm and dedication, the Choral Society of Our Savior's Lutheran Church under the direction of S.A. Millwater, presented a musical play "Sing A Song Of Sixteen" to the community at the Glen Head School Auditorium on May 24, 1946. The following reproduced page of the handbill attests to those daring individuals who so nobly represented our Church in their highly successful venture.

Over the years, the choir under the guidance of different directors/organists have presented yearly concerts in addition to their Sunday services.

While this tradition of additional musical endeavors has not always continued, we still enjoy and appreciate the talents of those who lead us in our worship service. The choir's function is to lead the liturgical responses, sing special liturgical responses, and offer special songs of praise within the liturgy.

#### **ORGAN**

The organ is synonymous with the words "church and music". Our Savior's Lutheran Church was blessed from its beginning by having a piano to supplement the Congregation in their musical praises. The first organ was a hand pump organ . . . an "antique relic" found in the basement of Mr. Panish's home. It cost \$50.00 and required extensive repairs before it was operational. It was equipped with a temperamental air pump which many times refused to utter any sound. The standby piano was always available. Both instruments were handled by the talent of Camilia Hanson, wife of Pastor Hanson. When the new Church was completed, a piano was used to accompany the music.

On November 26, 1948, the fund drive for a new organ received a substantial boost. "The Mariners", singing stars on the "Arthur Godfrey Time" radio show on WCBS, presented a music concert to benefit the Organ Fund as noted in the program on the following page:

The first major organ was a Baldwin Organ. It was less than a year old when it was destroyed by the fire on December 9, 1949. Over the years other organs were installed including an organ from a theater in New York City. George Ashley had it transported to Our Savior's Lutheran Church where he had it successfully rebuilt to serve the worship service.

Our current organ is a Moller Pipe Organ, built in Hagerstown, Maryland, at a cost of \$14,000.00. The console is located on the right side of the Transept, and the pipes are located behind the Altar in the Apse.

#### THE 3F's

During the early 1950's, a group of active members of Our Savior's Church formed an organization, naming it "The 3F's" which connoted FAITH, FUN, and FELLOWSHIP.

The 3F's were a successor to a monthly Bible studies group and was started in 1954 shortly after Rev. Winfield Johnson returned from being recalled by the U.S. Navy. Rev. Ralph Glenn followed Rev. Johnson and noted that the 3F's were an active group during his nine years of service. The group met in one another's homes on a monthly Saturday night basis. Many of those involved are still active at Our Savior's Church while many others have moved to distant locations.

A discussion or study (not too structured) was usually the program of the evening, while producing an event for the interest of the entire congregation or occasionally going to a local event were added items. Always the comraderie of the group who enjoyed the fellowship of being together socially, was the significant activity of the 3F's in the history of Our Savior's Lutheran Church.

#### MEN'S GROUP

The first Father and Son banquet was held on June 18, 1948, with Mr. S.A. Millwater as Toastmaster. Speakers were Dr. Irving Olsen, Marshall Hanson, and Mr. O. Moore. Music was provided by Albert Trinche, Harry Nelson, and Erling and Ralph Thompsen.

Later, a Men's Club was formed and served for a period of time before finally subsiding. However, in the latter part of the 1980's, the Men's Club was revitalized. Today, although small as an active group, it sponsors the Annual Family Picnic, the Octoberfest, a Sunday Brunch,"Ladies Night Out", and other family gatherings. They also provide a source of talent for general maintenance and special projects around the Church.

#### **BOWLING**

Under the leadership of Sidney Cehon, the men of the Church organized a bowling league on September 14, 1949. The new alleys in Sea Cliff were booked for the season. Over the years, the league grew substantially with the addition of people from the community. At one point, the membership was close to 100. In time, the league began to subside, and eventually it dissolved, having fulfilled an exciting community activity initiated by Our Savior's Lutheran Church.

#### CUB PACK 117

In October 1956, it was determined that the local Cub Pack was overcrowded, and there was sufficient need to sponsor another Cub Pack. A decision was made by three men in our Church to sponsor Cub Pack 117. They were supported by a committee of six men and seven Den Mothers.

By July, 1957, an enthusiastic program was underway due to the excellent participation of these sponsors. In October 1957, there were 46 Cub Scouts registered in Cub Pack 117. Later, when the Cubs reached the age of 11 years, they had the opportunity to become members of Scout Troop 117.

For many years, Cub Pack 117 provided a well-organized Cub Scouting program for our local boys of Cub Scout age under the leadership of Lloyd Welken, Cubmaster.

## BOY SCOUTS TROOP 117 - EXPLORERS POST 117

On January 9, 1949, a Boy Scout program was formed when our Church sponsored Troop 117 for the community. During the period from 1949 to 1965, over 125 boys took the Scout Oath as members of this Troop. G. Eriksen was the first Chairman, and Ed duBois was the Scoutmaster. Many men in the Church and community gave their effort and time to serve as committeemen and provide transportation to distant campouts.


Meetings were held every Friday night in the Church basement and consisted of instructions in first aid, safety, etc. as well as team games. As First Class Scouts acquired merit badges in many specialities, they achieved the rank of Star, Life, and Eagle Scouts.

Those who achieved the Eagle Rank were:

As scouts became 15 years of age, they were eligible to become Explorer Scouts and participate in a separate program, selecting a speciality and, to a degree, to be self-governing. Post 117 had 15 Explorers.

Ed duBois, Eagle Scout, Explorer/Advisor, Post 117, Order of the Arrow, National Lutheran Lamb Award, and George Rostad, Scoutmaster, Troop 117, Order of the Arrow were the leaders of Our Savior's scouting organization. They enjoyed the experience of working with the youth in their preparation for manhood.
